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Balanced Parenting For Successful, Independent and Safe Youth Who Thrive 3/2/17

- Parents know the depth of students, and teachers know the breadth; the intersection of the two is where something special happens
- Tips:
- 1.) **Know your values**, and model them in your house/ classroom
 - "Not for ourselves alone" meaningful quote outside a Virginia school about interconnectedness
 - Give kids a moral compass
 - If you are their moral compass and you are not there, will you still be proud of the choices they make? Will they?

2.) Give your kids chores to do

- There is nothing that needs to be done that is beneath you
- Every kid has to pull their own weight; no one is entitled; the world doesn't owe us anything
- Ex: introducing the kids to "Mr. and Mrs. Washer and Dryer"
- 3.) Eat right
- 4.) Get enough sleep at night
- 5.) Eat meals together: no cellphones allowed
 - Consider the person you are in the company of others

- 6.) What's popular isn't always right

- o Ex: the sit in protest in the school
- 7.) **Have a growth mindset** (Carol Dweck)
 - o = the attitude you have as to whether or not you can succeed
 - It's better to take on stride and struggle than to get an A
 - Ex: the college student who thanked the committee for their critique
 - Make mistakes and see the value in making mistakes

- 8.) Let mistakes happen to kids

- Many kids don't encounter a brick wall (loss)
- Then when they do, they don't know how to cope with it
- Model out loud to kids how you cope
- 9.) **Teach kids to be thinkers and problem solvers** (means you fail more times than you don't)
 - Kids are going to change jobs and careers many times in their lives
 - o Talk to kids about problems in your lives and theirs
- 10.) Make school about learning, not about the grade
 - Students need a sense of striving
 - o It helps if kids/ teens have a passion or other interest besides school

- 11.) Park the helicopter

- Have kids make as many decisions as they can on their own (even if the decisions are lousy); that's part of being human, and that's part of life
- Have your kid be their own advocate (that means talking to their teacher/ boss on their own)

- 12.) Affirm your unconditional love for your kid
